One of the readings for Sunday is from Paul's letter to the Thessalonians. After the salutation, Paul begins the letter with this: 'We always give thanks to God for all of you.' It is a sentiment which resonates with me.

Worship through the Month of May

Right now – May 1 – our Governor's PAUSE Order expires on May 15th. Does that mean we will resume in person worship on May 17? No. Here's what is being discussed among the COVID-19 Task Force and what will be discussed with Session at our regular meeting on May 19.

First, we will most likely have a delayed return to in-person worship. That is, if businesses open during the week of May 17 our earliest in person worship will be three weeks later in early June. This delay to starting in-person worship after businesses reopen is to monitor infection rates to see if it is safe for us to begin to gather in person.

Second, if infections do not 'spike' we most likely will begin in person worship in phases. Bible studies and meetings of committees and session will likely continue via Zoom. Sanitizing the building and keeping it disinfected is an important part of our ability to gather safely in the building.

Third, online worship will continue to be a vital part of our life together for several reasons. Regarding COVID-19, people like me, over 60, represent an increased vulnerability which won't decrease until there is a vaccine or reliable treatment. Also, online worship enables us to stay connected to members and friends who are miles away or unable, for any reason, to be in the building in person. And online worship empowers us to widen our circle to those who are seeking, but leery of entering a church building.

As we begin to be able to worship in person, *how* we do online worship may undergo change: right now, we are recording the pieces of the service and then they are edited together, and links sent out. When we can gather, worship will most likely be live streamed. It will still be possible to record folks from a distance and share readings or music with the congregation via our screen in the sanctuary. And practices in worship are likely to be altered as well: wearing masks, sitting every other pew, substituting no touch methods for the Passing of the Peace along with changes to how we observe communion.

There are a lot of 'likely(s)' and 'may(s)!' That is because there is a lot of uncertainty. The task force, the session, and I are following guidance from our governing bodies and health professionals along with input from our congregation to make the best choices that we can.

What won't change is our mission: to share and show the love of Jesus; to live out the Two Great Commandments – to love God with all our minds, with all our hearts, with all our soul, and with all our strength and to love our neighbor as ourselves. What is also certain is that God is with us and post Easter we know that God can change 'dead ends' into new life, new realities and new possibilities.

I believe that God is doing something new among us. On good days I am excited about that. On bad days, which I have, I struggle. But whether I am having a good day or a bad day, God is still at work, God can still be trusted, and God will see us – you and me – through.



Highlights of the April 21, 2020 Session Meeting via Zoom

Worship: Following group discussion it was agreed that on-line worship will continue through May 17th – to include 4/26, 5/03, 5/10 and 5/17. The worship situation will be reassessed at our Session meeting on May 19, 2020.

Personnel: DPC will continue to pay its hourly employees for hours worked and provide support to the RPMs leader.

Environmental Justice: A proposal was made to host an educational event around Aug. 30, the Sunday nearest Sept. 1, World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, or a Sunday between Sept. 1 and Oct. 1, the period known as the <u>Season of Creation</u>.

Building and Grounds: Matt Cooper reported progress with his search for the most sensible replacement for our leaky water heater. Pam Taft suggested a local high schooler who is weeding around the church grounds.

Communications: Laura Scott has been extremely busy communicating on Facebook, YouTube, Zoom, email updates, coordinating Zoom meetings and filming and audio editing for Sunday worship. Laura thanks Jack Gajewski, Matt Cooper and Dan Lewis for their help.

Finance: Dave Rees reported that, despite the recent hits to our investments, the church is basically in a good financial position and account balances are just about where they should be at this time of the year.

Worship: Nina Nichols reported that five special Lenten services were planned. Nina Nichols, Shirley Greagan, Jack Gajewski, Nate Cady, Laura Scott, and Pastor Karen Pollan are participating in these Lenten services with worship around a theme and specially written calls to worship.

Deacons: Sarah Carroll reported that palms were delivered on Palm Sunday and Easter plants on Easter. Deacons continue their phone calls and are providing support to a family affected by COVID-19.
