
I don't know about you, but I've always hated to wait. I know it is immature of me, but I tend toward instant gratification. When I was a child.

#### SESSION DIGEST

## Highlights of the November, 2017 Session Meeting

- Rev. Pollan welcomed this year's confirmation class to the Session acknowledged meeting and that Katarina Rees, Evan Finke, Mary Fleischut, Matt Phang, Amelia Hertz, and Will Storrs have successfully completed this year's confirmation class. Each member of the class that was present at the meeting described their community service experiences, read an affirmation of faith, and explained why they chose particular affirmation of faith. Session approved Evan Finke, Mary Fleischut, Matt Phang, Amelia Hertz, and Will Storrs as new members of our congregation. They will be received as new members in worship service on December 3.
- The Chair of the Congregational Life Committee presented а from ioint recommendation the Subcommittee of the Congregational Life and the Buildings and the Grounds Committee for replacement of the current range/oven in the kitchen. The current range is very old and difficult to use. Session approved a maximum expenditure of \$3,500 from the Capital Improvement Fund to replace the current stove with two gas ranges with two ovens in each. The estimate includes the purchase of the two ranges, delivery, and hookup of gas lines by a plumber. There will be a

- future recommendation for replacing, or adding, other appliances in the kitchen.
- The Chair of the Personnel Committee circulated a written proposal of the 2018 Pastor compensation package and other staff salaries and benefits, which was approved by the Personnel Committee. A discussion followed, and the proposal was approved by Session.
- A discussion took place regarding a \$4,736.25 grant that our church received from the Jermain Legacy Account. Rev. Pollan asked for any ideas for the use of the funds. The Christian Education Chair proposed that a revolving fund could be established which would allow members who had a good idea to be able to obtain a small amount of money quickly to fund a special activity. The grant could fund dozens of small projects or new initiatives. A written proposal and written guidelines for the use of the fund will be developed.
- Session received a written and in person report from the Chair of the Financing Committee outlining the income and expenses through October 31. Pledges received are higher than anticipated as we are 83% through the year and pledges received are at 86%.
- Session received verbal reports from the Chair of the Christian Education, Communications, Worship, and Nominating Committees.
- Session held a discussion regarding the current woods beautification project.

- Session approved the October 17, 2017
   Session Meeting minutes.
- Session established communion dates of December 3<sup>rd</sup> (pew service) and 24<sup>th</sup> (late service, by intinction), 2017.
- Session approved building requests from: Lynda Spielman, for member Water Color classes on April 14, 21, 28, & May 5, 19; Jim Cronce, for Cub Scouts Pack 272, on the first Mondays, 6-7pm; and from Jessica Freitag, for a Birthday Party for her son, December 10, 1:30 – 7pm.
- And, Session established their next meeting to be held Tuesday, December 19, 2017 at 7:00 p.m.

#### "New Views" Woods Project is Underway

As you know, DPC is in the midst of an exciting landscaping project.

"New Views" is the culmination of a two-year study involving the entire congregation. The goal of this woods beautification project is to make our church more welcoming, with increased visibility and attractiveness. In the process of doing this we will also remove dead and leaning trees, old stumps, and other debris, according to the Woods Beautification Committee proposal.

Anyone travelling through the crossroads of Delaware and Cherry Avenues will now be able to see our church clearly. More importantly, we want everyone to know that they are most welcome to visit us, to walk our new trails, and to sit and rest while enjoying the trees, flowers, birds, butterflies, and wildlife that inhabit our property. Additionally, the project will enhance access to the church's unique state-of-the-art playground, available to everyone in the community, including children with disabilities.



In both design and construction, our goal was to keep standing as many healthy trees as possible, and to create selective openings, windows if you will, for "New Views" of Delmar Presbyterian Church.




### What is it???
