Pastor's Page

Texans, especially West Texas, observe the changeability of local conditions remarking: "If you don't like the weather, just wait a bit - it'll change." Or as the weatherman in the play Greater Tuna puts it "Hail in the early morning giving way to devastatina heat by midday, followed winds. by high thunderstorms and tornadoes in the afternoon and locusts, we'll be

covered in locusts "

We've had a New York version of this lately with the weather shifting from hot and steamy to damp and cool and back again. Should I wear a tank top or a sweater? And then there is the ever changing and, at least to me, quite confusing guidelines (?) for addressing health concerns regarding Covid.

A parishioner recently sent me a picture of this sign on a restaurant:

- Mask Policy -To be consistent with CDC and NYS guidelines, we have no idea whether you need to wear a mask or not.

It seems impossible to forecast the best or safest measures to take. The good news is still good – infection rates are down and, in Albany County 65% of eligible people have received at least 1 dose of the vaccine. The concerns are still real - those 11 and under are not eliaible to be vaccinated and the increased presence of the Delta variant is on the rise.

The leadership of DPC is still 'staying the course.' That is requiring masks in worship, maintain social distancing, and not having congregational singing. Like West Texas weather this could all change quickly! I did read an article recently that said while dating the start of a pandemic is fairly easy, dating the end of a pandemic is problematic. So, my prayer and hope is we

continue to stay calm, be patient and treat one another gently. I believe we can all get across the finish line together even though we are all weary of hearing about and being impacted by the pandemic.

This summer I am preaching the semi-continuous readings from the Revised Common Lectionary which follow the stories of King David of Israel. His anointing by the prophet Samuel to be the next King of Israel was a new start – but it wasn't a smooth transition and there were many bumps along the way. I am reading these stories through the lens of our changing times and the 'new start' we are experiencing as we practice hybrid worship: in person and live streaming. I am hoping that Israel's story can provide insight and encourage our hope in God's faithfulness.

I will be gone some in July to take care of some family concerns and then to enjoy the mountains of Alaska for a time of renewal and rest with my sister. I hope your July is full of fun and beauty.

Christian Education


Families with unvaccinated kids are invited to meet up at 9:15 a.m. on the lawn outside church for a brief children's service/lesson before regular worship.

Book Study



For summer reading, consider the book, "The Testament of Mary," by Colm Toibin, a New York Times Notable Book and shortlisted for the Man Booker Prize. There will be a book discussion planned for September. Feel free to stop by the office for a copy.

Amazon review: PROVOCATIVE, HAUNTING AND INDELIBLE, Colm Tóibín's portrait of Mary presents her as a solitary older woman still seeking to understand the events that become the narrative of the New Testament and the foundation of Christianity.

In the ancient town of Ephesus, Mary lives alone, years after her son's crucifixion. She has no interest in collaborating with the authors of the Gospel. They are her keepers, providing her with food and shelter and visiting her regularly. She does not agree that her son is the Son of God; nor that his death was "worth it"; nor that the "group of misfits he gathered around him, men who could not look a woman in the eye," were holy disciples.

Mary judges herself ruthlessly (she did not stay at the foot of the Cross until her son died—she fled, to save herself), and her judgment of others is equally harsh. This woman whom we know from centuries of paintings and scripture as the docile, loving, silent, long-suffering, obedient, worshipful mother of Christ becomes a tragic heroine with the relentless eloquence of Electra or Medea or Antigone. Tóibín's tour de force of imagination and language is a portrait so vivid and convincing that our image of Mary will be forever transformed.

Highlights of the June 16, 2021 Session Meeting

The Session recorded various email votes which were approved as follows: 1- building use requests for a Family Promise concert on May 22, and the use of the Fellowship Hall for a Quaker memorial service for July 10; 2 – for the Bell Choir to rehearse without masks; 3- Reopening date and continued live streaming of worship as of June 13; 4 – Baptism of Josephine Walthall on June 6, 2021. These constituted a report from the Core Ministry.

Other reports from Care and Support Ministries were received. The Care Ministry reported on DPC involvement and support for a number of activities, such as the Albany Crop Walk, Soul Fire Farm, and Family Promise. A complete list is noted in their meeting notes of May 12. The Support Ministry reported on their work in securing proposals for an air handling/air conditioning system, landscaping and design steps, COVID update, and the annual audit of the church's books. Pledges are running behind and a special appeal will be made.

The Session had a general discussion on how the Session reorganization was going. The arrangement is to be continued for the time being.

The session approved the following motions: to discontinue contact tracing and to continue requiring masks during worship; to allow the Minister of Music to work with fully vaccinated unmasked singers who are 12 feet away from the congregation, and to move the Minister of Music's AC unit to the organ side of the sanctuary.

Pastor Karen advised that she is officiating at a number of funerals, and of her vacation plans for mid-July to early August.
